## RESEARCH INTERESTS

My research examines the psychological dynamics of morality and politics, specifically focusing on moralized political conflict in the United States. A central component of my work is identifying the cognitive and emotional mechanisms underpinning these conflicts, and how these processes may be reversed. More recently, I have explored perceptions by the public as well as public officials of democratic transgressions and political violence in the U.S. Ultimately, my work aims to uncover the roots of moral conflicts and chart out effective strategies for their de-escalation and resolution.
